## DISCOVER THE SLAVE LAKE REGION


Whether you're looking for a daytrip, weekend getaway, or are visiting family, the Slave Lake region is a thriving part of the province offering diverse adventure and an abundance of activities centred around Alberta's second largest lake (Lesser Slave Lake). Located just 2.5 hours from Edmonton or 3.5 hours from Grande Prairie, this untapped location boasts four seasons of outdoor experiences—and bountiful opportunities for those looking to establish a tourism operation. At the heart of the region is the town of Slave Lake, a tightknit community with the amenities of a retail hub, that embraces the small-town lifestyle and makes visitors feel at home.



### CHOOSE YOUR ADVENTURE


The Slave Lake region spans more than 10,000 square kilometres and has hundreds of lakes, rivers, and trails to discover, including Alberta's largest automobile-accessible lake and one of the longest public beaches in the province. Activities include:

- Paddle boarding, kayaking, canoeing, swimming, boating, and water skiing
- Fantastic fishing, hunting, and host to many sports tournaments
- White sand beaches
- Annual events and festivals
- 18-hole golf course
- Biking, ATVing, and walking trails
- Nature tours, wildlife tours, and bird watching



### A TRAIL FOR EVERYONE

- **Songbird Trail:** easy, 0.6 km, year-round hiking, biking, and skiing
- **Peace River Trail:** difficult, 60 km, year-round hiking, snowmobiling, and ATVing
- **Nine Mile Recreation Area:** moderate, 10 km, year-round hiking, biking, and skiing
- **Lily Lake:** difficult, 2.8 km, summer hiking
- **Devonshire Beach to Northshore:** moderate, 4.8 km, year-round hiking, biking, and skiing
- **Trans Canada Trail:** difficult, 23km, part of Canada's longest continuous recreational trail



### EMBRACE WINTER

- Snowmobiling, snowshoeing, cross-country skiing, skating, ice fishing, and more in the great outdoors
- Swimming, skating, yoga, and arts and culture programming
- Front row seats to the Northern Lights



## WHERE TO STAY

Camping season runs from May 20 to September 30 and there are plenty of options for accommodations:

- 10 campgrounds/RV resorts with over 700 camping sites
- 5 locations that rent out a total of 30+ cabins
- 6 hotels (*some include Stay & Play golf packages*)

Restaurants and retailers abound in the town of Slave Lake, ensuring you have everything you need, whether you're here for a day or starting fresh as a new business owner in the region.

### Lesser Slave Lake Provincial Park

Use the provincial park as your campground or as a playground for year-round activities.

Educational sessions, interpretive trails, and bird watching with the 250 bird species in the area.

Regional fishing tournament hosted annually in June with a field of up to 100 boats.
